

Introduction

With global population is expected to reach 9.1 billion by 2050, global food production will need to grow by 70% in order and to feed that number of people. Africa's population is projected to reach 2 billion people by then. In order to avoid mass hunger and food insecurity, farm productivity must accelerate at a faster rate than the global average. Food insecurity is considered a global concern as anchored in goal 1; Ending poverty in all its forms and goal 2: Ending hunger to achieve food security and improve nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture, of the post 2015 Sustainable Development Goals (SDG 2030). African countries have the youngest population in the world and the largest share of the world's available arable land. Agriculture plays a vital role in Africa's economic growth and social improvement. It has the highest percentage of the workforce population, about 65%, and contributes to about 30% of GDP in most African Countries (Africa Agriculture Status Report, 2015). For now and the foreseeable future, agriculture is and will remain the primary employment growth sector for most developing countries. Agriculture is a big employer both on and off the farm and is likely to grow with continued transformation of food systems and growth in domestic demand for food.

The Youth Division of the Africa Union Commission indicated that about 65% of the total population of Africa is below the age of 35 and 10 million youth enter the labour market annually. Youth unemployment rate remains low in Africa. Sub-Saharan Africa's youth unemployment rate was slow at 11.8% in 2012 and is projected to drop to 11.7% (Africa Agriculture Status Report, 2015). With the current youth bulge and restiveness, dollar fluctuations, global decline in oil and fall in market shares index, there is an urgent need to promote agriculture as a culture, career, fun activity and a viable business. Rural and semi-urban SMEs especially those led by or focused on young small scale farmers need to be encouraged at all levels across the African region. Agriculture need to be incentivized in such a way that both urban and rural, educated and uneducated, rich and poor youth can participate and benefit in the coming transformation especially in line with the STISA-2024, Africa Rise Campaign, Africa Agenda 2063, CAADP and 2014 Malabo Declaration on Agriculture.

Consequently, the CAADP Youth Network was formed at the Youth Side Event organized by African Youth initiative on Climate Change (AYICC) with support from Young Professionals for Agricultural Development (YPARD) during the CAADP Partnership Platform held by the African Union Commission and NEPAD on April 12, 2016 in Accra – Ghana, principally as an African regional consortium of youth organizations and networks working on agriculture and sustainable livelihoods across Africa and to

mainstream African Youth into the CAADP and 2014 Malabo Implementation and Monitoring Processes especially the Joint Sector Review, NAIPs and RAIP.

Our Vision

A continent with a strong youth voice and capacity to transform Africa's agricultural sector for comprehensively improved food security, sustainable development and shared prosperity.

To inclusively develop capacity of African youth on CAADP and 2014 Malabo Declaration and build actionable partnerships for effective youth leadership in the CAADP implementation, mutual accountability, RAIP/NAIPs and Joint Sector review processes of the African Union Commission, NEPAD and partners.
