The Islamic Development Bank Institute is responsible for knowledge creation and dissemination in Islamic Economics and Finance.

ICIEC - 1994

The Islamic Corporation for the Insurance of Investment and Export Credit provides investment and export credit insurance for Islamic Countries.

ICD - 1999

The Islamic Corporation for the Development of the Private Sector supports the economic development of its member countries for the private sector projects.

ISFD - 2007

The Islamic Solidarity Fund for Development Provides financial support to enhance the productive capacity and sustainable means of income for the poor.

ITFC - 2008

The International Islamic Trade Finance Corporation is a catalyst for trade development among OIC Member Countries.



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







Women and Youth Empowerment – A longstanding commitment of the Bank

- The first **Women in Development Unit** in the Bank was established **in1998** and a Women Advisory Panel **in 2004**.
- The WYE Division/program was established in 2018
- Women Empowerment Policy adopted in 2019
- Providing a voice for youth **since 2011** 13 Youth Development Forums so far
- Youth Summit in 2017 strategy formulation, establishment of dedicated unit for youth and women; Youth empowerment strategy – 2020-2025

 - Ensure women and girls have access to primary, secondary, and higher education and vocational training, as well as promoting their enrolment in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) and other fields
 - Provide special focus on maternal health through several initiatives targeting neglected areas and marginalized populations in IsDB Member Countries (examples: Afghanistan, Somalia, The Gambia...)
 - Advocate for national policies to be sensitive responsive to women and girls' needs and support IsDB member countries' adherence to their international commitments
 - o Facilitate women's access to productive and financial resources



HOPE (Harvesting Opportunities for Poverty Eradication) :

Program Objective

Strengthen the capabilities of MSMEs in Member Countries to augment their role in national food security initiatives, addressing the present food crisis and reinforcing defenses against forthcoming food security challenges.

Program Interventions Mechanisms

To extend a durable Financial Facility Package through carefully selected Financial Institutions, plus non-financial aid and capacity empowerment via strategic local/regional collaborations. **Component A:** Blended Financing Facility for the Small Farmers, Cooperatives and MSMEs in the Agriculture sector crop production, livestock, fisheries, and aquaculture.

Component B: Capacity Building, Access to Markets, and/or Empowerment for MSMEs (with special focus on W-Y led MSMEs)

C Component C: Enhancing Financial Institutions through IsDB's Economic Empowerment Toolkits and Developing a Robust Islamic Finance Ecosystem

Component D: Digitization of Agriculture and Financial Institutions for Data- Based Interventions

HOPE (Harvesting Opportunities for Poverty Eradication) :

This program is designed to finance two distinct categories of projects, each with a specific focus and objective:

- <u>Pipeline Projects</u> under the Food Security Program:
 - HOPE will design and finance complementary projects (rather than mere components) aimed at enhancing the downstream aspects of identified IsDB GPP commodity value chains, such as Cassava, Rice, Wheat, Millet, Sorghum and other commodity value chain. The emphasis will be on improving access to finance and implementing de-risking strategies for smallholder farmers and MSMEs
- <u>Standalone Pipeline Projects for Economic Empowerment and Poverty</u> <u>Reduction within the Agricultural Sector</u>:
 - This classification encompasses projects requested by Member Countries, aimed explicitly at promoting economic empowerment and combating poverty

HOPE TUNISIA: Youth and Women MSMEs and Entrepreneurship Support Project (YWESP)

Project Overview:

The YWESP aims to increase economic engagement and income-generating opportunities for youth and women in all of Tunisia through improving the capacity of Tunisia's private and public sectors to generate new decent and sustainable jobs for young women and men. Along with enhancing the capacity of Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) through financial support, technical assistance, and capacity building.

Elevating the productivity and sustainability of small-scale farmers, cooperatives, and micro, small, and medium-sized enterprises (MSMEs) within the food and agriculture sector.

Focusing on strategic interventions that enhance agricultural practices, promote innovative technologies, and foster sustainable business models.

Create a resilient food ecosystem that not only meets the immediate needs of Tunisia's population but also ensures long-term environmental and economic sustainability.





Goals:

Women Techsters Initiative Nigeria

Project Overview:

The Women Techsters Initiative is aimed at bridging the wide gender divide between men and women in the technology ecosystem as well as ensuring equal access to opportunities for all. The initiative aims to empower girls and women aged between 16 and 40 years across Africa with varying degree of digital, deep tech and soft skills required within the technology ecosystem.

Goals:

The objective is to grow, train and support tech empowered girls and women across Africa who will have equal access to decent job opportunities and build and scale their ideas into tech-enabled businesses and deep tech startups, to aid Africa's economic growth. The digital skills training modules of the Women Techsters Initiative focuses on 5 core learning tracks:

1) Product Management

2) Product Design

3) Software Development

4) Cybersecurity

5) Data Science and Artificial intelligence

SheTrades:

- **Goals:** support businesswomen in food processing sector in Morocco and handicrafts in Egypt.
- Achievements:
 - in 2022, a total of 75 business-women was supported to sustain and grow their businesses as well as connect them to global value chains.
 - Increased women-owned SMEs participation in export-oriented value chains in order to enhance their competitiveness and ability to penetrate local and regional markets.
- The program is now in **its 2nd phase** of implementation and is expected to close in **2025**.



Obstetric Fistula:

- Project Overview:
 - 15 Projects Financed: Across 12 countries (e.g., Guinea, Mauritania, Nigeria).
 - Focus: Social and economic reintegration of women affected by obstetric fistula (OF).
- Coalition to Stop Obstetric Fistula:
- Scale-Up: Implemented in 5 high-prevalence countries (Afghanistan, The Gambia, Pakistan, Sierra Leone, Somalia).
- Recent Development:
 - 2023 Approval: Fistula project for Afghanistan.


Youth Entrepreneurship Ecosystem Reports for Pakistan and Maldives & Toolkit


